Dear Friend...

When was the last time you sat down to pen a letter by hand? Or received a letter in the mail from a loved one filling you in on their life? Speaking for myself, it's been quite a while. I recently cleaned out a box of childhood mementos and found a huge stack of notes I had exchanged with friends. We shared our secrets, our frustrations, our funny [embarrassing] encounters—we shared it all. Thumbing through them it struck me how these letters have been replaced by emails, and emails have honestly been replaced by quick texts or Facebook messages covering our most important highlights.

There is a wonderful intimacy to the art of letter writing. It is a guiet space where one ends up revealing in a way

that can be difficult in person, or misread online. It takes time and care. Also the handwriting! You can see so much about a person by the way they write—how messy or meticulous. Do they doodle? Did they cross out a section? Can you see what they wrote underneath the crossed out section? That was always my favorite.

Written correspondence is a key element in the storytelling of She Loves Me. We find ourselves in Budapest, Hungary in 1937. Two feuding shop clerks at Maraczeck's Parfumerie, Georg and Amalia, have each answered a "Lonely Hearts" advertisement in the newspaper. Their romantic exchanges on paper are only heightened by the anonymity of guessing who is on the other end. Additionally, another very important letter is anonymously passed along to the shop owner, Mr. Maraczeck. I don't want to spoil anything, though, so you'll have to stay tuned for that.

This idea of the public and private self is one that felt essential to focus on. We all carry around this duality, and choose to reveal and exercise various sides of ourselves in different settings. For the clerks at Maraczeck's we see much of their public persona at work and stolen moments in between customers where their private selves are shared. It has been fun to make choices about the secrets, or lack thereof, being held by the characters in this world.

It is important to note why the balance of the public and private self is different for the characters in She Loves Me than for you or me. Now, our private self is more often shared to the public. We post photos of meals we cook, status updates about going to the gym, family gatherings, etc. We generally have the ability/burden to create and publicize the "private" version of ourselves. It's all a mess. People living in 1930's Hungary did not have the forum, or the freedom.

It was also a period of delicate balance between two world wars. Budapest was a refuge for many escaping the strife that was going on in the rest of Europe, so jobs were hard to come by, and the clerks working in parfumeries like Maraczeck's did not have the luxury of sharing anything but their most graceful public persona. Their livelihood depended on it.

Along the way, we have called She Loves Me a "postcard" to these days gone by. It captures a quiet, nostalgic charm the way a handwritten letter does. If you know the show, you will see that we may have doodled in the margins a bit but the body of the text is the same.

I hope you enjoy, and maybe after you get home tonight, sit down and write someone you love a letter. It'll do you some good.

Joe Masteroff (Book) studied with the American Theatre Wing from 1949-1951 and began his career as an actor, making his Broadway debut in *The Prescott Proposals* in 1953. Following a national tour, Masteroff's

first play, *The Warm Peninsula*, opened on Broadway in 1959 with Julie Harris, June Havoc, Farley Granger, and Larry Hagman in the lead roles. In 1963, he wrote the book for the Sheldon Harnick-Jerry Bock musical She Loves Me, which garnered him a Tony Award nomination for Best Author of a Musical. Three years later, when Hal Prince gained control of the rights to John Van Druten's play *I Am a Camera* and *The Berlin Stories* by Christopher Isherwood, he discarded the book for a musical adaptation already written by Sandy Wilson and hired Masteroff to fashion his own. With lyrics and music by Kander and Ebb, *Cabaret* won the Tony for Best Musical and ran for 1,965 performances.



Jerry Bock (Music) was an American musical theater composer. He received the Tony Award for Best Musical and the Pulitzer Prize for Drama with Sheldon Harnick for their 1959 musical Fiorello! and the

Tony Award for Best Composer and Lyricist for the 1964 musical Fiddler on the Roof. Bock's additional collaborations with Harnick include Tenderloin (1960), Man in the Moon (1963), She Loves Me (1963), Fiddler on the Roof (1964), The Apple Tree (1966), and The Rothschilds (1970), as well as contributions to Never Too Late (1962), Baker Street (1965), Her First Roman (1968), and The Madwoman of Central Park West (1979).



Sheldon Harnick (Lyrics) is an American lyricist best known for his collaborations with composer Jerry Bock on hit musicals such as *Fiddler* on the Roof. Harnick began his career writing words and music to comic

songs in musical revues. One of these, "The Merry Minuet", was popularized by the Kingston Trio. It is in the caustic style usually associated with Tom Lehrer and is sometimes incorrectly attributed to him. Harnick wrote the libretto for the opera Coyote Tales, with music by Henry Mollicone, which received its world premiere at the Lyric Opera of Kansas City. He wrote the book, music and lyrics to the musical Dragons, which was performed in 2003 at the Luna Stage (Montclair, New Jersey). He wrote the lyrics and cowrote the book with Norton Juster for the musical The Phantom Tollbooth, based on the book by Juster. The musical premiered at the The Kennedy Center in 2007.
